The Rector Writes

The Gospel which is the focus of our lectionary readings for this Church year is the Gospel of Mark. As we continue our journey through Lent, we can find two images of Jesus in that Gospel. In the earlier part of the Gospel, Jesus is full of urgent action and the word 'immediately' appears almost 40 times. However, when the Gospel moves on to his betrayal, trial, passion and crucifixion – which is essentially the second half of Mark's Gospel, Jesus is no longer the active party, but rather he practices 'purposeful passivity'. And the surprising thing is that both were equally powerful in their own way. Obviously, those who experienced Jesus reaching out and touching them had every reason to appreciate his activity. However, in John's Gospel we find that Pontius Pilate, his wife and a Roman centurion, all people who had never previously met Jesus, came to understand that Jesus is the Son of God – not from his activity, but from his inactivity. To translate that into today's world, which had often been described as a hive of hyper-activity, stillness and calm can make the greater statement especially to those who are trying to make sense of a confusing world and of their lives.

This reminds me of a session of talks



that Rev John Saxby, former bishop of Lincoln, gave a few years ago. Teasing out the balance between meaningful activity and purposeful passivity, the bishop posed the question, 'what is the greatest need in our world today?' After a short discussion it was unanimously agreed that 'Peace' is our greatest need - peace in ourselves (in our hearts and minds), peace in our homes and families, peace in our communities, peace amongst peoples and nations (just take Ukraine and Gaza for example) – the peace which only God can give which passes all understanding. In our Holy Communion Services when we are encouraged to exchange a sign of peace, it is precisely this we are invoking God to bestow on ourselves, our neighbours and our world. The sign of peace is NOT a simple greeting as one might exchange in the street or at a formal introduction with a mumbled 'How are you?' (which is usually a greeting and not a question!) It is much more profound than that and a refusal to exchange a sign of peace is a refusal to invoke God's peace on ourselves and those around us - a refusal to be an instrument of God's peace in the world.

The bishop posed two further questions. The first, using the analogy of the woman who suffered from haemorrhages cured by Jesus, is; 'How generous is the hem of the Church's cloak?' Is it possible for people to reach out and touch it and to receive a generous healing and peace? The second is; 'How wide is the circle of the Church and who is included (or indeed who is excluded)?' To graphically illustrate this he likened the Church's options to a person entering a huge multi-floored high-end department store

which offered the choice between an escalator or a lift to move between floors. The Church can either opt to be like a person who only wishes to visit a single department and chooses the lift.

They press the button for their chosen floor and is transferred to their chosen destination or department without any 'contamination' or knowledge of what is available in other floors of the store. Or, the Church can opt to use the escalator and thereby see all that is on offer and even interact with it as they make their way to their ultimate destination. If a Church is serious about mission and evangelism (which I sincerely hope we are here in Tullow), it must choose the escalator option.

FOXROCK LOCAL PISCORY CLUD

The History Club's Next Public Lecture is on: -TUESDAY 19TH MARCH 2024 IN THE FOXROCK PASTORAL CENTRE @ 8.00 P.M.

A Forgotten Irish Author: Cornelius Ryan, 'The Longest Day' and 'A Bridge Too Far'.

SPEAKER: - Philip Lecane



Cornelius Ryan was born in Dublin in 1920. Educated at Synge Street School, he became a reporter in England. Attached to the American Army during the Second World War, his experiences led him to write *The Longest Day*, the best-selling account of the D-Day invasion. He had further success with *The Final Battle* and *A Bridge Too Far*. *The Longest Day* and *A Bridge Too Far* were turned into blockbuster films with all-star casts. Ryan died in 1974, at the height of his success. He was 54. Once world-famous, he is now virtually forgotten. This talk will be given fifty years after Ryan's death.

Dundrum, Foxrock and Kingstown Railway 1865

In the coming months FACE hopes to install panels in the car park in Foxrock village which will depict the history of the Harcourt Street Line but did you know there was a proposal to have a line running from Dundrum to Kingstown (Dún Laoghaire) via Foxrock?

The line would have left the then existing Harcourt Street line just north of Foxrock station and would have crossed Westminster Road at what is now Primrose Cottage - at the time it was the only house on Westminster Road. A revised road network at the end of Torquay and Westminster roads would have meant a level crossing approximately where The Terrace is now. The route would have taken it to Cornelscourt, Clonkeen Road, Rochestown Avenue before joining the Kingstown line near Glengara Park.

As was the procedure at the time, the proposal was discussed at a House of Lords committee in March 1865. William Bentley, the developer of Foxrock, was among those who spoke in favour of the proposal; Lord Longford, who complained that the line would cut up and disfigure his estate, and others spoke against and the proposal was not approved by the committee.

During the discussion at the committee it was said that in 1848 the population of Foxrock was one herdsman and a couple of hundred sheep and cattle! According to an opposing barrister the population of Foxrock at the 'last census' (presumably 1861) was 48. It was also said that there were two shops in Foxrock - a grocer and a provision merchant.
