The Rector Writes

As the familiar rhythms of autumn once again takes hold, the summer, (such as it was!), quickly becomes just another fading memory for most of us. For some it presents the opportunity to take a late holiday break away from the madding crowds of peak season. For others it is back to school for another academic year and a chance to catch up with classmates they may not have seen since last May/June. For still others, it is a time of preparation to start third level education and the freedoms and responsibilities which that entails.

However, there are segments of today's society for which very little changes. In this context, the housing crises of

homelessness, unaffordable rents, escalating house prices and scarcity of suitable housing/accommodation is an ongoing nightmare for many. Even third level students coming from outside the greater Dublin area find themselves at a major disadvantage and in the past couple of years the drop-out rate from some third level courses is reported to have risen to 30% - largely driven by the impossibility for students to make ends meet. But it is not only students who are



affected, but many of our Dublin schools are experiencing a chronic teacher shortage due to teachers seeking and taking up positions in parts of the country (or abroad) where housing is more affordable and commutes are less demanding. As we face a General Election in the coming months, either later this year on early next, this issue will undoubtedly will be high on the list of priorities for the electorate.


Our Christian faith tells us that all human beings are created in the image of God. This core belief, at the very least, means that every man, woman and child has the right to have dignity. And at its most basic, dignity requires that people have a roof over their heads which they can call home. As a country, as a society and as a community we need to do all in our power to ensure that we address and deal effectively with this seemingly intractable issue with all possible haste and resolve it for once and for all.


Letters for Life Tuesday 10th September



CONSECRATION OF TULLOW CHURCH, CARRICKMINES.

His Grace the Archbishop of Dublin yesterday solemnly consecrated the new district parochial church of Tullow, Carrickmines. This church is erected on a site generously presented by Mr. W. W. Bentley, the funds being provided jointly by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners and the inhabitants of the rapidly-rising neighbourhood of Foxrock, Leopardstown, and Carrickmines. The edifice, which has been built according to plans by Messrs. Welland and Gillespie, architects to the commissioners, is of the middle Gothic period of architecture, and consists of the main building running from east to west, with bell-tower and spire, entrance porch on the south side, and vestryroom with transept on the north. The building has been executed by Mr. Thomas Waldron, of Sunnyhill, Kilcullen, of solid masonry; granite being chiefly em-ployed. The windows are of the lancet pattern, with two lights, a rose with stained glass being introduced. The mullions as well as the dressings generally are of cut stone. The building is roofed with ton slates and is neatly finished with ornamental crested ridge tiles. Internally, the church presents a very handsome appearance. The roof is nearly fully open, the beams and rafters, which are highly polished, being visible. The furniture is plain but appropriate, and is oak, stained throughout. The pulpit is nicely designed and executed. As a whole, the building presents one of the neatest specimens of rural church architecture with which we are acquainted. Its position, likewise, has been most advantageously selected in the centre of a charmingly broken and tumulated district, with a lovely combination of the most beautiful features for which this portion of the country is celebrated.

The ceremony of yesterday commenced at shortly after twelve o'clock, on the arrival of the Archbishop of Dublin. His Grace, who was attended by the Venerable Archdeacon Lee, was received at the entrance gate by the Very Rev. the Dean of St. Patrick's, the patron of the living; the Rev. Ronald M'Donnell, incumbent of Monkstown; Rev. Dr. Moeran, Dundrum; Rev. Thomas Wallace, Kill-o'-the-Grange; Rev. L. H. Bolton, Drumconrath, county of Meath; Rev. Thomas Sill Gray, Rev. Mr. Moffett, rector of Kilternan; Rev. Mr. M'Donough, l'owerscourt ; Rev. Mr. Slater, Killiney ; Rev. Mr. Hackett, Crinkin; and the Rev. John Fawcett, incumbent of Tullow. At the church door Mr. John Hasler Samuels, proctor, read the petition praying that the church might be consecrated, to which the Archbishop gave his assent. The ceremony then took place, the Archbishop and clergy proceeding up the church towards the communion table, I salm xxiv. being recited. The deed of conveyance having been handed to his Grace, was by him placed upon the communion table, after which he addressed the prescribed exhortation to the congregation, and said the prayers required by the Liturgy. The service for the day




A Prayer in times of change – especially the changing of a season

Shops and business premises destroyed on O'Connell Street after the 1916 rebellion.

The events of the 1916 rising had impacts not only in the city centre but for people living and working in the suburbs. Cathy has traced the claims made by residents in Foxrock to the Property Losses Committee for loss of businesses in the city and other property lost such as jewellery left in for repair etc.

Cathy has spoken to our club in the past on aspects of Dublin history and always bring new insights into local history from her researches in the archives that slowly are being made available. This talk is guaranteed to highlight interesting stories about people who lived in this area in this 1916 period.


