The Rector Writes

We are approaching the first anniversary of Hamas' brutal attack on Israeli civilians with over 1200 deaths and almost 250 taken hostage. These attacks justifiably widely condemned and described as a war crime. However, one year on, the situation in the Middle East is even more volatile with continuing attacks by Israel on Gaza, West Bank and Southern Lebanon and a risk of all-out war in the region (even though it is hard not to describe the current situation as all out war). Again, war crimes are being committed - this time largely by the Israeli forces and their command. There has been some condemnation of these crimes, but it is much more muted. The result is a double standard that does not augur well for future world peace. Added to this, the resulting human suffering is a catastrophe that is virtually impossible to imagine. Civilians including the most vulnerable are dying from starvation and lack of access to basic health care. The current death toll in Gaza alone is estimated to be in excess of 41,000 - some 1 in 55 of the pre-war population. How can human beings inflict such suffering on others? How can this horror be brought to an enduring and speedy end?

The Old Testament gave a command of, 'An eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth'. The basis of this was to create some form of parity of justice. Under no circumstance could the current death toll, overall destruction and resultant suffering be described as a parity of justice or retribution. And Our Lord, went further when he said, 'You have heard that it was said, "An eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth." But I say to you, Do not resist an evildoer. But if anyone strikes you on the right cheek, turn the other also; and if anyone wants to sue you and take your coat, give your cloak as well; and if anyone forces you to go one mile, go also the second mile. Give to everyone who begs from you, and do not refuse anyone who wants to borrow from you.

'You have heard that it was said, "You shall love your neighbour and hate your enemy." But I say to you, Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, so that you may be children of your Father in heaven; for he makes his sun rise on the evil and on the good, and sends rain on the righteous and on the unrighteous. For if you love those who love you, what reward do you have? Do not even the tax-collectors do the same? And if you greet only your brothers and sisters, what more are you doing than others? Do not even the Gentiles do the same? Be perfect, therefore, as your heavenly Father is perfect. Matthew 5:38-48

Moving to a more positive note, October is our traditional month for Harvest Thanksgiving. This year our Thanksgiving Service will be on Sunday 20th. Although there may be a temptation to feel pessimistic, there is much to be thankful for. For instance, we should never take the hard work of others for granted. We may sometimes forget to be grateful or show appreciation for the time, effort, dedication and skills required in some of the more menial tasks which keep our lives comfortable and running smoothly. However, it is very important at this time of Harvest Thanksgiving that we make the effort to acknowledge and give thanks for these as well as all other blessings so freely given to us by God.

Letters for Life 10th September

Letters are a literary art form and many examples were read at the recent fundraiser for the Irish Cancer Society. They ranged from the quirky to the humorous to those which will stay long in the memories of the audience.

The personal nature of many of them, with the donors in the audience, added to the experience. They included a letter from Erskine Childers to a 12 year old girl, a letter from Stan Laurel reminiscing about his time in Ireland, Samuel Beckett bemoaning the rain and wind in Dublin but probably the most memorable letter was only discovered at 5pm the night before. A 25 year old RAF wireless operator from Cowper Road wrote a farewell letter to his parents; he was killed in 1941 just 17 days after writing the letter which was found by his nephew who, along with his brothers, was in the audience.

That letter will be read at the 10.30am Service on Remembrance Sunday 10th November - don't miss it!



There are very few people who have not been touched by cancer and this showed in the enthusiastic support given by everyone involved in the Letters for Life event. The celebrity readers - Andrew Porter, Geraldine Plunkett, Joseph O'Connor, Madeleine Keane, Peter Collins, Sinead Moriarty, Stephen Collins, the musicians - our own Nathan Whitley and the Wesley Trad Group, the team on the night - all said YES straightaway when asked if they would be involved. Not only did the audience buy tickets (it was sold out!) but many people who couldn't go on the night gave donations.

Everyone's generosity was extraordinary and we are thrilled that the Irish Cancer Society has received €10,160 so a huge THANK YOU to everyone who took part and who came to watch what was a very entertaining evening.

Outreach - Down Syndrome India

What greater gift can our Tullow Parish Christian community give - a full life opportunity to a needy child.

Harvest 2017 was the birth of our Outreach Programme 'Down Syndrome India' and in that time we have funded, each year, a life saving operation for a child in

India with the common heart defect that often comes with Down Syndrome. This is lifesaving surgery allowing the children go on to fill their full potential.

We have been offering parishioners the option of throwing their loose coins in the glasshouse at the rear of the church or taking a collection tin home, again available at the rear of the church, for a more sustained giving experience.

This year we have had a lot less in the tins, under ≤ 150 in total, but with operations costing in the region of $\leq 2,500/\leq 3,000$, we may need a more reliable funding model BUT we go forward in faith and as I write there is a message gone out to Down Syndrome India asking about their current needs.... To help us continue to fund life-saving surgery for little children please take a collection box from the Outreach area at the back of the church and pop your spare coins and notes into it.



Mitchell and Son

Mitchell and Son is Ireland's oldest wine merchants. Established in 1805, they used to be on Grafton Street before moving to Kildare Street and the company is now run by the 6th and 7th generations of the Mitchell family. They were, and still are, well known for their Green and Red Spot whiskies. According to one of the family, Irish whiskey was THE whiskey to drink right up to the 1920s. That may explain why Charles Dickens, who lived in London, got whiskey delivered from wine merchants in Dublin. He obviously liked what he ordered as he sent a letter of thanks dated 1877 which is still in the firm's archives.

Mitchell's have had a connection with Tullow Parish for over 60 years and one of the family still sings in the choir!
