Traffic Barrier

If you've been near the church recently you'll have seen the new traffic barrier between the church and the Rectory. We have had many discussions in the Select Vestry regarding the parking chaos in the church car park - even to the

extent of seeking advice from local gardaí and a representative of Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown Co. Council traffic department. On a Saturday, or when kids are being 'lifted & laid', you would think you were at the dodgems!

The barrier is only the first part of the solution and the intention is to give the Rectory family, and whatever tenants are in the cottage, some 'quiet enjoyment' plus guaranteed parking, and to protect them from any melee at the front. Hopefully their exit route will be respected.

We can, of course, have the barrier set in the raised position - during a fair for example, but in the main it will remain closed. The residents will have a code/fob system to operate it.

The fact that €4,500 was raised for Bray Women's Refuge and parish funds was due to the generosity of parishioners and their friends who visited the gardens, to the garden owners and their families, the team of helpers and especially to Jennifer Sowman whose idea it was and who organised everything with flair and efficiency.



The highlight of the Christmas Fair for most of us is the goodies we can pick up at the cakes and deli stalls. As it's most unlikely we'll be able to have a Christmas Fair this year - here's the next best thing! Many of the talented cooks and bakers who stock the deli and cakes stalls will be sharing their favourite recipes with us in the newsletter over the coming months.

To get us started here is a recipe for banana bread which Jennifer Sowman insists is the BEST (despite others claiming that title on social media!) and also a really tasty recipe from Helen Burns for a warm tomato salad which can be a lunch dish or a starter.



Best Banana Bread

200g SR Flour
50g soft margarine
1 egg
50g castor sugar
Grated rind of 1 lemon
3 ripe bananas mashed

Handful of raspberries/blueberries/sultanas/pitted cherries as available

TOPPING: Juice of half a lemon with 30 to 50g castor sugar mixed

Heat oven to 170 (fan) or 180 (regular).

2lb loaf tin either lined or greased and floured

METHOD:

Rub margarine into the flour with your fingers, add everything else and stir. If dough is too crumbly add a tiny bit of milk.

Spoon into prepared tin and bake for 45 minutes on the middle shelf.

Leave to cool for 10 minutes in the tin, then put on a wire rack with a plate underneath, make holes over the top with skewer and drizzle the topping over.

TIP: if you have a banana getting too ripe, peel and freeze in a plastic bag. When you have 3 remove from freezer a few hours before making the cake.

Warm Tomato Salad

Serves 4

Sourdough loaf
200ml olive oil
6 cloves garlic peeled and crushed
1 red onion
Salt and pepper
3 tblsp red wine vinegar
1 tblsp capers

- 1 kg tomatoes of any type
- 1 bunch basil
- 1 big bunch chives

Handful finely grated Parmesan

Break the bread into big bite-sized chunks and bake in a moderate oven for 5-10 minutes until golden brown and crisp. Leave to cool. This can be done the night before. You could just toast the bread well and break it up into chunks. This next bit can be done in advance as well. Very gently heat the garlic and olive oil. Don't let the garlic colour, just warm it through, then add the red onions and stir. Turn off the heat and leave to soften in the warm oil. Season well and set aside until almost ready to eat. It won't take long to finish.

Chop the larger tomatoes into quarters but if using a combination have them all the same size. Whole cherry tomatoes, some quartered plum ones and a few larger ones roughly chopped work well. When you're ready to finish the cooking heat the olive oil with the garlic and onions and get it very warm. Add the vinegar and capers and get it bubbling. Then add the tomatoes and stir for a minute. Turn off the heat and add the bread, herbs and Parmesan. Add black pepper and pinch salt and serve straightaway.

Outreach - Bray Women's Refuge

They were able to keep up their outreach programme and phone lines throughout the lockdown and fortunately there weren't any Covid cases. The administrator said "you are so good, you always think of us". So thank you all for what we were able to give to them.

Evergreens Walking Club

The club usually begins the walking season in October. However this year we are all suffering from lockdownitis and all our movements are regimented to Government Covid 19 precautions and public health advice. I had hoped to organise a walk before the end of this year and this may well happen subject to the next Government review in mid September. Right now it is possible to walk in small groups, subject to social distancing but with additional precautions for the over 70s and medically vulnerable, which form a large core of our membership, including myself. So instead of an official Evergreen walk I have suggested a suitable walk that may be undertaken by families or residents of a household. This month's walk, like all walks, can be completed in whole or in part.

The Avonmore Trail

This is a fairly new trail extending from Laragh to Rathdrum along the Vale of Clara. I recently explored much of it and I can vouch for the wonderful views of the Wicklow Mountains and the Avonmore River. The trail is 12 kms long and the notice at the car park suggests a walking time of 3 to 3 ½ hours. The good news is that it can be completed in two sections. The official start is the car park below the Mountain Rescue Hut about a kilometre on the Dublin side of Laragh. Cross the Avonmore River by the bridge and follow the way mark signs through the forest. There is some road walking before the trail descends through the

forest to meet the Avonmore River at Clara. There is a most scenic church and bridge here overlooking the river, and a great place for refreshments! There are options here of turning back to the start, or driving to Clara to start the hike here to commence the second half of the trail. From here to Rathdrum the trail follows the river through gorgeous mixed woodlands and would be my preference for a walk. Another option is to walk the first half and to return to the start by going over Trooperstown Hill. I came back by this route but would not recommend it unless one had a map, compass and good navigation skills through the forest!

Good outdoor clothes, including a hat and gloves, are essential together with boots or sturdy shoes, and bring refreshments and a drink.

Early Days of Foxrock

It has been well documented that the Bentley brothers started developing Foxrock in the 1850s with the building of the railway station in what is now, the village. It was intended that the area would also be a holiday resort and in 1860 the brothers built a large hotel beside the station calling it the Victoria Hotel. It was planned to lay out an ornamental garden with a large lake, orchard and play area. The ornamental garden was laid out but the lake never materialised. It was then advertised as renowned for the purity of air. The Bentleys provided a coach service to Kingstown and, later on, weekend trips to the mountains. The stables were situated on ground now taken over by the filling station.

Unfortunately for the Bentley brothers, there was no great rush to purchase housing sites in the area in the 1860s, nor were Dublin dwellers keen to take holidays in the Victoria Hotel. They continued to use the east coast - Dalkey, Bray and Arklow. By 1867 the banks were moving in and the Bentleys moved out. Later the Royal Insurance Co. purchased the land and it was this company that was responsible for creating the village of Foxrock.

Having realised that staff were required by the owners of the big houses being built they decided to convert the hotel into accommodation for the working class people. In 1879 fourteen families moved in and took up employment as gardeners, coachmen and dairymen. In 1901 extra accommodation was provided in the village. Eight dwellings were built in the orchard and named Orchard Cottages and a further twelve were built and named Brighton Cottages. Compared to the old Hotel these cottages were considered luxurious having a large garden, running water and their own toilets. They were designed to face the railway as most of the traffic passing through Foxrock went by rail.

By 1910 there were 34 families living in the village. The cottages were given to the residents of the big houses for the use of their employees though this arrangement did not always suit the village people because if you lost your job you lost your home! This practice was discontinued in the 1930s as residents in the cottages refused to leave their homes.

The first shop opened in the village at No.1 Brighton Cottages followed by a shop in No.11. A Mr. McEvoy and Mrs. Lynch were the proprietors. In 1906 Alex Findlater opened his shop adjacent to the Railway Station. (now The Gables)

To cater for sightseers at the weekends two tea shops opened at Nos. 2 & 3 Orchard Cottages. Proprietors were Mrs. Foran and Mrs. Sharp. Some time

later a Mr. Tully opened a dairy at No.12 Brighton Cottages. Most of the village people kept hens and goats. In 1910 a temporary church was erected on Torquay Road to cater for the village and surrounding area. This was removed when Foxrock Church opened in 1935.
