All too soon another summer season has come to a close. Our schools are reopening their doors and third level colleges will follow shortly.

Hopefully, this year will see much less disruption to in-school classes and third level tuition will take place on campuses. I wish all those who are embarking on the path of formal education for the first time, those transitioning from Primary to Secondary education, and their parents every blessing. I also wish every success to those who are moving on to further education or starting out in employment at this time.



At the time of writing, uncertainty still remains regarding the lifting of health restrictions relating to indoor activities including Church Services. Regarding the latter, choir and congregational singing is still problematic under current guidelines. There is much speculation about a 'vaccination dividend', but little of substance has come of this to date. Again, I am hopeful that more flexibility and clarity will be brought to the feasibility of all parish activities - both religious and social, very shortly.

Uncertainty has been the predominant theme of the past eighteen months and nobody has been left unaffected. As we now approach what has been described as the 'end game' of the Covid-19 pandemic, let us resolve to get our lives back on track and to resume those positive activities which have been necessarily put on hold. As part of that resolve, I would strongly encourage more to return to in-Church Services – remembering that in line with all other health, safety and welfare regulations, our parish is, and will continue to be, fully compliant.



Tullow Bazaar October - November

This is the second year we haven't been able to have a Christmas Fair, or most of the other parish activities, and many of us are missing the fun and parish bonding which go with joining in such events.

So - given the uncertainty which is still around, this year we're doing something different!

The word bazaar means a marketplace so our bazaar will be a mix of online selling starting in October and will finish with (hopefully) a physical event in the Parish Hall at the end of November.

We hope to gather 100 items <u>suitable for selling online</u> as part of a Silent Auction bid. These will be released weekly a few at a time and sold to the highest bidder at the end of each week. The traditional Christmas goodies, as well as other items, will be sold at the event in the Parish Hall.

Tullow Crafty Crew


Would you like to craft and chat?

It will be well worth the wait!




Tullow Garden Trail

Thanks seems a very small word for all the garden owners, helpers and organisers Jennifer Sowman and Margaret Breadon but all your efforts are really appreciated.




Photographic Archive - Tullow in 2004

The Organ


An organ built by a Mr Brown was originally installed in the church in 1894; an organ blower was employed who was paid £2.14s.0d a year. This practice was continued until electricity came to Foxrock in 1930 when an electric blower was installed.

The original organ was sold to St. Andrew's Church in Dunmore East for £110 and a new one, built by Peter Conacher and costing £1,000, was dedicated in 1929. It was a gift from an anonymous donor who stipulated that only a male organist could be employed!

Following the discovery of woodworm extensive repairs were carried out 1961-1963 and the organ was substantially rebuilt by Trevor Crowe in 1998.

Music is an important part of Services in Tullow and we are very fortunate to have Dr Paul McNulty as our organist and choirmaster. What would Carols by Candlelight or our Easter, Harvest and Christmas Services, not to mention the weekly Sunday Services, be like without the beautiful sound from the organ?

Thanks to Bob Willis and Paul for their care and oversight of this beautiful instrument.

We praise you for your goodness forever and ever. **Amen**.




Over the last couple of summers many of us have explored the four corners of Ireland. We may be familiar with the popular holiday spots but here are some hidden gems which parishioners have discovered and share with us.



Glanleam Bay, Valentia Island, Kerry

This is a little gem of a spot, tucked away beside the entrance to Glanleam House and Gardens. No matter what time of day the light is beautiful and different for every visit. It can be approached by boat or by walking down the winding, unsurfaced road to the little beach. Magical!



Our recent discovery was a 21km cycle route along the river Suir's 17th century towpath from Clonmel to Carrick-on-Suir. Along the way we passed by beautiful bridges, centuries old castles, towers and churches and enjoyed the relaxing effect of the beautiful countryside. Colclough Walled Garden

This gem of a garden is beside Tintern Abbey on the Hook Peninsula in Wexford. Pronounced Coke-lee, it was built over 200 years ago but lay derelict for many years until a group of volunteers started restoration in 2010. There's a very special atmosphere; try and get talking to one of the volunteers - they're a mine of information about the plants and you'll walk away with a bag of whatever produce is in season. White Strand, Louisburgh, Co. Mayo

If you love walking on a beach then this hidden gem is for you. It's over 6k in length, beside the better known Silver Strand and is about 25k south of Louisburgh. You could walk for hours on this beach and not see another person. You can walk from Silver Strand or drive down to White Strand - just don't drive over the river or you could get stuck!

Foxrock and the Jane Austen Connection

Gortanore, formerly called Fáilte, is the derelict house beside Thomas' shop on Brighton Road in Foxrock village. The Foxrock stream rises in its garden so the ground is often waterlogged. It is said that its boggy garden inspired Samuel Beckett to use Boghill as the slightly derogatory name for Foxrock in his radio play *All that Fall* which was set in Foxrock.

Gortanore's other claim to fame is that Jane Austen's grandniece Cassandra Hill came to live there at the turn of the 20th century. Born near Ramelton in Donegal in 1842, Cassandra remained single, felt and declared herself Irish and spoke the language fluently. Her best friend was Charlotte Grace O'Brien, the daughter of the Young Irelander William Smith O'Brien. Many unmarried women in those days were at the mercy of relatives to home them and Cassandra had to find someone to take her in when her brother sold the house in Donegal. She turned to her friend Charlotte Grace who gave her the use of the house on Brighton Road and, in fact, she was listed on the 1901 census as the head of the household. Cassandra died in August 1901 of 'haematoma' and 'exhaustion' and is buried in Deansgrange Cemetery beside her brother George.
