
Christmas Fair fun is back!

Thanks to Covid we were unable to hold our usual Beckett event in March but this is the next best thing. Settle down and enjoy these two specially commissioned films in the comfort of your own home.

The Beckett Country tells the story of Samuel Beckett, Nobel Prizewinner, born on Brighton Road and Tullow parishioner. The Foxrock area, Carrickmines Golf Club and, of course, Tullow feature in this short film which is narrated by Dr Feargal Whelan. Feargal will be familiar to attendees at previous Beckett in Foxrock productions.

The End by Samuel Beckett is a darkly funny tale memorably performed by Marcus Lamb. The descriptions of the river flowing into the bay, the surrounding hills and their burning gorse strongly evoke the area around Foxrock and the wider south County Dublin.


Harvest Thanksgiving Service

A Woman Ahead of Her Time

In the early 70s I was working in Irish Welcome Hotels and, when the general manager retired, I was asked to take on his job managing the first marketing group of 28 privately-owned hotels in the country. This involved a lot of travelling and my first trip was to London was so that I, the first woman to hold that position, could meet the Irish Tourist Board staff in London and also our main travel agents. The second trip, which was at the height of the Troubles, was to emphasise the all-Ireland nature of the group by visiting hotels in the north of Ireland. Being the first female was an advantage as there was great interest in me and the group which, of course, attracted the attention and publicity we were looking for.

In 1973 at an Irish Tourist Board Ireland workshop in Frankfurt Irish Welcome Hotels was represented by an all-female team - unheard of up to then.

In 1975, for the second time, I stepped into what had been a man's role when I took over the Irish Hotel and Catering Institute as Director and, so that I wouldn't get bored (!), I also took over the Irish Restaurant Owners Association and the Inter Hotels group, running the three organisations from one head office. Inter Hotels covered hotels in Ireland, Britain and Europe and I was the

first woman on the Council of Inter Hotels Europe and only the second female elected onto Skål Dublin. Skål is a worldwide organisation of travel, tourism and hospitality professionals. During that time I was also on the committee which selected the Irish national team of chefs for Hotelympia at Salon Culinaire, regarded as one of the world's top competitions for chefs. It is held in London every two years and John Howard, owner/chef of Le Coq Hardi, won the first gold medal for Ireland in 1976. During the period I worked in tourism I had to cope with highs and lows but the challenges I had to overcome only made me thrive and didn't stop me enjoying the experience. Between organising and attending conferences, lunches, dinners and meetings, as well as all the paperwork involved with three organisations, it was a seven-days-a-week job. When I left five people took over my job!


As was common practice at the time, when I got married in 1979 I left work but a few years later I became manager of the Arklow Bay Hotel which was owned by my husband's family. Following the sale of the hotel I moved to manage the Hibernian United Services Club, then a men-only club on St. Stephen's Green. I changed careers after my husband died in 1997 when I became the Bed Manager at Blackrock Clinic.

Thankfully there is less need to be a trailblazer for women in the workforce nowadays.




Tullow Treasures Wilson Window

As you will be reading this within a few days of Remembrance Sunday it may be an appropriate time to look at the Wilson Window in the south transept (the wing to the right of the altar). It was erected in 1919 by the father of Charles, George and Arthur Wilson of Carrickmines House (at the entrance to Brighton Hall), all three of whom were killed in the First World War. The window is by Beatrice Elvery and depicts three knights in armour offering their swords to the

Lord. Beatrice, Lady Elvery was also responsible for the window on the left behind the choir seats as well as the bronze lectern.

The Wilson Window is always a place of interest on the Beckett tours of the church in the summer but many people may not know about the memorial to the 18 year-old Nathaniel Hone who was killed in the Battle of the Somme. It is inset into the side of a pew in front of the Wilson Window.






Prayer penned for Ecumenical Service of Reflection and Hope held in St. Patrick's Cathedral, Armagh on Thursday 21st October 2021
