The Rector Writes

There is something about the month of February that makes it very special to me. It may be because it was the month I was born, but I believe it is far more than that. Although there is an ongoing debate as to whether the season of spring begins in February or March, I would argue that much of spring's groundwork becomes apparent during February. The days are growing longer and brighter. And although we can often get the coldest weather of the year at this time, we can also see the beginnings of new growth. Snowdrops, crocuses and daffodils add welcome colours after the 'monochrome' of winter. This, in turn, alerts us to beginning of the growth season and for many gardeners, begins the cycle of lawn cutting and maintenance.

This year we have a further reason to celebrate February. The announcement of the lifting of most Covid-19 related restrictions on 21st January has meant that most of us can now look forward to experiencing a return to a more recognisable normal. Of course, it does not mean that Covid-19 has gone away, but with a high level of community vaccination and new viral therapeutics, we no longer have to fear the worst health outcomes. However, for many, the letting go of fear and anxiety will take some time and for some, professional help will be required to enable them to move forward. The necessary enforcement of self-isolation during the worst of the pandemic has translated to lonely isolation for too many and has resulted in a lack of confidence in self and in society. For those delighted and excited with their new found freedoms, I would pray that they may have patience and understanding with those less enthusiastic. For those fearful of reengaging with others, I would pray that they may have the faith to do so. To quote 1 Corinthians 12:12, 16, 'For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the



members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honoured, all rejoice together with it.'

It is my hope and prayer that as a Church community we will all find the confidence to get back to meeting each other again in prayer and fellowship in a regular and safe manner. Over the coming weeks we will be planning towards a Lenten Course and a parish Spring Fair. Details of both and all other activities will be communicated in due course.




Ashling Murphy and Aoife Beary

The whole country was united in grief and horror at the murder of Ashling Murphy while she was out jogging near Tullamore. In common with many other places, a vigil was held in Foxrock Village on Sunday 16th January. Organised by FACE (Foxrock Area Community and Enterprise), over 300 people were there to remember Ashling and also local girl Aoife Beary, both of whose lives were tragically cut short. The Rector, Fr Killian Dunne and Maeve Davidson, community worker from Foxrock Parish spoke movingly; the young Pegum family of musicians played beautifully and local girl Anna Kearney added to the emotion of the occasion by her haunting singing.

For the last few years **Down Syndrome India** has been one of the charitable organisations which are supported by Tullow Parish. The children, whose lives we have saved by donating funds for life-saving surgery, have been previously featured in this newsletter and we are delighted that they are all thriving.

Bray Women's Refuge is the other major charity supported by the Parish.

Several charities are also supported via the green jar and occasional special collections.

It Started 40 Years Ago - Down Syndrome India

Sometimes when we reflect on life we realise that many incidents and people have had a major impact on it...what would life have been without a 'Babli' who has been instrumental in creating change, not only in my life but on every person she has come in touch with.

Born on the 8th of Jan in the year 1981, in circumstances that shook me and our family...she was premature and was called a blue baby. I accepted that but not what followed after that...12 pediatricians peered into her crib and made very pathetic sounds as if to say there was no hope ..

Yes my friends what seems like a lifetime of experiences, I was given one

shock after another. My little one was born with multiple medical issues. If I trace them the average parent will go into a shock.

Born with bilateral cataracts and a weak respiratory system, she needed surgery within 2 weeks of her birth.

Having a medical condition is a fact...but what is not acceptable is the attitude of the medical world. Every door we knocked on gave us no hope or worse still left one feeling absolutely helpless. The first doctor said leave her in an institution, go home and have more children. Some said she was a 'Waste'.

Shocked and disappointed I decided to take the situation in my stride and started attacking the so called pediatricians who were either not aware or disinterested in treating our children. Every child to me is first a child and then a child with a condition...Every where I went the same lines were thrown at me...Babli has Down Syndrome so she will be LIKE THIS....Like what?

Insensitive, callous, ruthless and misinformed...that was my description of the entire medical community and the society...It was left to us as parents to take it up and start fighting for our children. 1981 to 1994 was a war...every conference I would make it a point to address the pediatricians and try and make a change in their language. It was evident that it was now or never. No other individual should ever face such a predicament.

At every stage we faced resistance. Babli was born with multiple medical issues that were not identified at birth...bilateral cataracts, developed glaucoma and had four surgeries by 18 months. With this was the fact that she had a very weak respiratory system and had two bouts of pneumonia while she was just recovering from surgery. The doctor on call informed us that she would not survive the pressure on her lungs...I refused to accept this. For six weeks I tended to her while she was gasping for breath and kept her close to me to pass my warmth and positive energy...not for a moment did I think that she was critical. And yes after six weeks she bounced back and smiled at me as if to tell me that we had won the battle.

Joining school was again a huge challenge. Schools were discouraging, and guided us to special schools, where children with other challenges were grouped together. I challenged that and fought for her rights and got her into an inclusive set up. It was a battle, and continues to be in some states, but we are slowly getting to a more inclusive world.

Sports, dance, theatre were all Babli's interest. We pursued them with support and Babli set the trend for all the others. She was a national gold medallist in

swimming and was a natural classical dancer.

This gave us a clear idea of how to shape the lives of children born with Down Syndrome in India. We slowly stared moving from state to state bringing both the parents and the medical community into our fold. The biggest hurdle was a different language in every state. With the help of local groups we covered every corner of the country and today we can proudly share that we have slowly but surely empowered parents, siblings, friends and the community at large. We reach out to children from the remotest parts of India and give them medical care, early intervention and financial support for surgeries.

I am proud to say that 40 years later we have seen some change in the attitude of doctors, and definitely a more accepting society. We proved that individuals with disabilities were as capable as us given the right opportunity. They have tremendous potential and that should be identified and promoted. It has been a very satisfying journey and we continue to reach out to every family struggling with issues.

Today we have a huge medical community that is very supportive and better still are the school systems where children are integrated. We are working very hard towards an inclusive society.

Tullow Parish you have been one of our biggest supporters and all the children you have given financial assistance to are thriving.

Readers, book lovers and book clubs everywhere are invited to join in the Art of Reading with the Laureate, to read these outstanding books and tune in every month for the discussion.



We are delighted about the response to the proposed fitness class which will be run by Yvonne McMahon from The Fitness League.



Tullow Treasures
Silver Chalice


The beautiful silver chalice used for Communion Services was presented to the church in 1919 in memory of Nurse Sophia Violet Barrett who lost her life when the RMS Leinster was torpedoed in 1918. The inscription reads: 'To the glory of God and in memory of Sophia Violet Barrett, torpedoed in RMS Leinster Oct. 10 1918, when returning to duty in France. Presented to Tully Church by her fellow members of Carrickmines St. John Ambulance. Nursing Div.'

Sophia Barrett, whose name is on the memorial on the outside wall of the church, was born in Glenamaddy, Co. Galway in 1884. She came home on leave from France and spent her last week staying with the Wilsons at their home, Carrickmines House, Brighton Road, Foxrock. Her sister Elizabeth Barrett Armstrong saw her off at Kingstown (now Dún Laoghaire), so it seems most likely that there had been a family reunion in the Wilson house over the previous days.

After the recovery of Sophia's body, she was brought back to Carrickmines

House on Saturday 12th October 1918. Three Wilson sons had been killed in the war so we can only imagine the grief when Sophia was lost. On Monday 14th October her coffin, headed by a mounted escort of Hussars, was borne in an ambulance from Carrickmines to Kilternan Church where she is buried in the adjoining graveyard.



The Glendruid or Brennanstown dolmen, just off Brennanstown Road, is in the news at the moment due to land sale and access issues. In case you haven't seen this piece of history, it's estimated to be c5,500 years old and is one of the finest of the Irish portal tombs. It is also one of the largest examples, its capstone has been estimated to weigh between 40 and 70 tonnes.
