The Rector

Recently I was recommended a book entitled 'Soul Keeping: Caring for the most important part of you' by John Ortberg (Zondervan 2014). I have to confess that as I write I have not completed reading it. However, I am impressed with the author's interpretation of his subject. He begins the book with a question for himself which asks, 'Why is it that he, a person who holds a PhD in clinical psychology, is still unsure of who he is?' As he reflected on this question he adds another, 'What do people mean by soul?' To this second question he discovered that most people claim to know what 'soul' means, but when pressed fail to be able to define it. One of the most worrying things he discovered is that many, including popular culture, define 'soul' as being the same as 'self'. This encourages us to placate our souls with superficial, disjointed and transitory things, but those are at odds with the depth, unity and eternality that our souls actually need. In the end, the author plumbs for a definition given to him by his philosopher mentor, Dallas Willard which is: 'The soul is the life centre of human beings – it is the deepest part of us. and it is the whole person'.

From this, Ortberg goes on to explore how our souls can be cared for. Our souls are vulnerable and they need a keeper (besides God's role as captain). Our souls are on loan from God, so we must care for them. We must come to realise that, 'I and no one else am responsible for the condition of my soul'. The essence of soul care is to ensure that it is centred on a solid foundation: God. A soul centred on a less solid foundation such as 'self' is prone to whims, selfishness, discontent and ultimately, death.



As we begin the month of June we entering a time that can be extremely stressful for families – especially the extended families of those undertaking state examinations. For those undertaking their Leaving Certificate, years of study and preparation are concentrated into a couple of weeks of tests that can have a major impact of the candidate's future. Hopes and dreams ride on how many points can be achieved over these short weeks. It can be a time of uncertainty, anxiety, worry, self-doubt, nervousness and helplessness. It is a time which requires the ultimate in soul care. It is a time to ensure that every effort is made to strike a balance between rest and study. It is a time to seek calmness and peace - the calmness and peace which the world cannot give, but only God. Therefore it is a time to seek God's guidance and direction through prayer. Again to quote John Ortberg, 'If you don't come apart for a while, you will come apart in a while'. To facilitate this, our evening 'Sundown' Service on 28th May concentrated on those who were sitting end of term examinations and those about to sit sate examinations

The month of June can also see a time of change for whose finishing their primary education as they anxiously await their transition to their chosen secondary school. For some this is an adventure which they await with excitement, but for others it holds the dread of the unknown.

Again, it is good to commit the entire spectrum of feelings to God as we make that next step along the road of life.

Finally, we will be remembering all those who are preparing for State Examinations and their families during Services over the coming weeks.

We also be remembering those who have

undertaken third level examinations as they await results. We wish them all every blessing and may it be our prayer that all their hard work will be justly rewarded.

Welcome Thabi

My name is Thabi Madide, a Zulu woman born in Zululand, South Africa.

I am mom to one precious daughter. We live in Greystones and worship in Christ Church Delgany.

As Diocesan Lay Preacher in training, I have just completed a four-week placement period understudying Reverend John Tanner and Diocesan Lay Minister Alan Rhodes in Tullow Church.

To say I had a warm welcome in Tullow Church, is an understatement - I felt loved. I experienced a constant supply of warm smiles, kind words, jokes, encouraging feedback on my progress, and thoughtful gestures of understanding, when I was way off the mark; not to mention the delicious cups of tea and biscuits I was treated to. I also had the priviledge of helping Reverend Tanner conduct a Communion Service in St Patrick's Church in Dalkey. Although short lived, my experience in Dalkey, was positive and edifying. The joy brought about by fellowship experiences in Tullow and Dalkey, is similar to that which used to overcome me as a child, whenever we visited relatives - the sense that I have more people to love, who love me back also.

I love reading scripture passages and seeking meaning for my life from them. As a result I have several favourite verses from both the Old and New Testaments. My paternal grandmother got me reading the Bible as soon as I started school. She would trick me into reading scripture passages to her, by pretending that her reading glasses were faulty or that she couldn't find them. My paternal grandfather on the other hand introduced me to the poetical character of church hymns at a very young age too. Therefore, I am not a choir member because of my musical ability, but because of how church music affects me. I am not musical at all. I enjoy foraging for nourishing spiritual food from hymns, and I always get my fill. Again it is hard to declare one hymn a favourite, as I love many of them.

While I started sensing God's calling around 2009, not long after joining Christ Church Delgany, it wasn't until 2017 that I started realizing its genuineness. I really have no major reason why I didn't respond sooner, except that I thought I was mistaken, and that if God had wanted to use me like that, He would have done so when I was younger. Furthermore, I didn't think that imperfect people like me were worthy of God's calling. The most peculiar thing is, however, that during the period of resistance and denial, I noticed that I always struggled to the fourth stanza of The Summons (Will you Come And Follow Me.) It was always as if I was being told to shut up and listen. I would just stare at the hymn book and listen to my fellow congregants singing it to me. God finally used a visting peacher in our church to propel me forward. I had read in church that day, and afterwards he came to me and said, "have you thought of joining ministry?" I can't remember what response I gave, but I'm sure it was unstructured waffle. His parting words were "I'd advise you to give it your serious consideration." Following that conversation I realized that

there was no turning back, but boy! Could the the timing have been any worse? I started the application process nevertheless, and while awaiting the verdict, a fellow parishioner asked me if I would consider joining ministry. He had no clue that I made an application already. Anyway, my application was accepted and I began my training. Soon after, I recalled how I had been advised to consider ministry by a fellow student from Kenya as far back as 1996! I am now looking forward to being commissioned into Lay Ministry on 19th June 2022, albeit nervously. Mine has been well and truly a humbling journey.



- work on the church roof will start in July




A Prayer for the End of the School Year

Many of you may remember the Celtic rock group *Horslips* but did you know that their album *Happy to Meet, Sorry to Part,* released in 1972, featured Tully

Cross on the cover? It was the fastest-selling album in Ireland for eight years.

Tully Church, Lehaunstown Road

The original Tully church structure dates back to the 6th–9th centuries AD. One ancient name is *Telach-na-nun ecspop* (Tullow of the bishops) and it must have been an important venue if bishops met there.

In 1179 the Church was granted to the Priory of the Holy Spirit and was in use up to about 1615. It was abandoned after 1630 following severe storm damage.

The cross by the roadside is set upon a plinth and is dedicated to James Crehan (Grehan) who apparently saved the Cross from being discarded when the level of the road was being adjusted in the late 1800s. The plinth replicates the soil removed leaving the Cross standing at its original height.

There is a second cross in the field opposite Tully Church. This cross dates from the 12th century and is reputed to be dedicated to St Brigid. It's now a centrepiece in the new Tully Park which is being constructed as part of the developments in the area.
